REMINDERS

Capstone

All CSI Majors are required to take a semester long Capstone Internship Course. This is generally done your last semester. Students are required to find an internship in the field of Public Safety and Security and work a minimum of 8 hours a week for the duration of the semester. Start researching opportunities now. Some agencies require as much as six months to process an application.
