SUMMER STEM CAMP

Fun with Forensics A CSI Camp

PANAMA CITY — Tearing into packets purporting to hold the secrets to solving crimes, students attending the Fun with Forensics camp at Florida State University Panama City found not fingerprint dusters or luminol, but sunglasses.

If they were going to solve crimes like TV's "CSI" investigators, Charla Perdue explained, first they had to look like them. And Horatio Caine, the main character on "CSI: Miami," was always ready with a witty one-liner delivered from behind a pair of dark sunglasses.

"We want to make sure you're working on your one-liner for the week," said Perdue, public safety and security professor.

Throughout the camp, students will learn to use chemicals to identify different mystery powders, study blood spatter to determine trajectory and velocity of impact, and dust for fingerprints. First, though, they needed to tackle a series of word scrambles. While significantly less bloody than crime scene evidence, the scrambles were a tool for getting students in the mindset for solving crimes, Perdue said. After all, it's a rare crime scene where the evidence all immediately lines up and points to the killer.

"Solving crimes is like solving puzzles," she said.

Forensics, Perdue said, is also a fun way to introduce younger students to science, making them more likely to enroll in higher level courses in

high school and college. "What I really want is for them to get excited about forensic science," she said. "I want it to be something they love and want to do."

Opportunities like these allow CSI majors to increase their knowledge in subject areas and practice presentation skills. It builds
