Planning is underway for summer labs and the dates are included in this newsletter. Full details will follow around the midterm.



Earlier this year, I started my six-month internship with the Panama City Beach Police Department, in their Criminal Investigations Division. Immediately, I worked with multiple Investigators and was given several of my own responsibilities and tasks. Throughout the course of my internship, I was fortunate enough to assist with vehicle searches, evidence packaging, preservation letters, search warrants, video analysis, evidence inventory, case file preparation, public records requests, gun traces, FDLE submissions, cold case

investigations, and special operations involving Internet crimes to name a few. I additionally observed multiple arrests, interviews, and court proceedings. I was able to achieve all of this because I showed a commitment, enthusiasm, and willingness to learn. I learned very quickly that hours worked and opportunities presented are directly proportional within my internship at the Panama City Beach Police Department.

Fast forward from
February to present day, I am now
a full time employee with the
Panama City Beach Police
Department as Crime Scene
Investigator/Crime Analyst. Over
the course of my internship, I
volunteered over 500 hours and
this did not go unnoticed. Before I
was even an employee, I was
knowledgeable about the many
different aspects of my current
job.

My advice to anyone who is looking to turn an internship experience into future employment is to take full advantage of the internship opportunity and dedicate as much time and hard work to the experience as possible. It's time to put your education and experience to work. I hope that during your degree program, you have had a taste of the next step through seeking and securing an internship. An active Internship provides for a great experience and opportunities to network with professionals in the field who have a lot of knowledge and insight they will share, if you ask. Other opportunities are in forensic professional associations such as the Florida Division of the International Association for Identification commonly referred to as the F.D.I.A.I. This professional association's membership is primarily comprised of forensic professionals and open to student memberships. They hold an annual educational conference, provide free regional training seminars and post job opportunities on their website

www.fdiai.org.

Jobs in the public safety sector require extensive background vetting and CVSA or polygraph examinations. Be truthful, accurate, and consistent from your application content through any subsequent interviews. Any large discrepancies may be viewed as untruthfulness, which is a kiss of death in the hiring process.

A few tips in finding the next start to your career:


- Conduct Research on the Employer, Hiring Manager, Job Opportunity. ... (know what the job requirements are and the mission of the agency)
