Interning in Texas

I completed my internship with the Medical Investigation Unit of the Bexar County Medical Examiner's Office in San Antonio, Texas. BCMEO is the largest Medical Examiner's Office in the state, serving about 2 million people and is known for specializing in gunshot wounds. During the time I spent there, I attended death scenes, took scene photographs, helped tag and bag decedents, observed autopsies, obtained fingerprints, helped search for and collect evidence, answered phones, gained experience handling the media, and had the opportunity to work alongside several different agencies at the scenes. I assisted with homicides, suicides, overdoses, officer-involved shootings, decomposed decedents, automobile fatalities, accidental fatalities, sudden unexplained infant death reenactments and unknown causes of death.

I was fortunate to work with seasoned investigators who were passionate about their work and excited to share their knowledge with me. Not only did I learn about the death investigation process, but I learned about the history of the facility, its contributions to the field and about all the high profile cases it has handled throughout the years. Due to the large number of investigators employed at this agency, I had the opportunity to observe and reflect on many different styles of investigation and took away valuable knowledge not only about how to utilize specific personality traits as investigative strengths, but also about how to find my own style once I start working in this field.

My advice to future interns is to remember that no matter which agency you choose to work with, everyone you interact with at your internship is teaching you for free. They are volunteering time that could be spent on other things to benefit your academic and professional education, so keep this in mind and remember to express respect and gratitude to everyone who helps you during your time as an intern.
