I started applying for jobs immediately after graduating in the Winter of 2022. I interviewed with several different departments both in Texas and Florida before landing a job as a Crime Scene Investigator at the Sarasota Police Department.

I have been with SPD for almost a year now. The knowledge that I learned in the CSI program has been tremendous in helping me in daily work, both in the lab and out in the field. My daily responsibilities include responding to different calls and processing evidence for latent prints and DNA. Since joining the department, I became a member of the Florida Division of the

International Association for Identification (FDIAI).

The best advice I could give to future graduates is to never give up on finding your dream job. The field is very competitive and hard to get a foot in the door. Keep applying to jobs and gaining interview experience.

Making connections is the best way to start. I would also say getting an internship is an important step in gaining valuable experience for future jobs. Participate in everything and go the extra mile to learn anything and everything you can.

Intern Highlight

When I was looking for an agency to complete my capstone internship, I was hopeful I would find an agency that did not require me to be a citizen of the U.S. as I am currently only a resident. After a lot of "no" and three semesters of searching, the Leon County Sheriff's office granted me the opportunity to be one of their interns and the location happened to be 4 minutes away from my apartment. Also, someone I knew from summer labs 2022 worked there.

I went into my internship feeling anxious. During week one of my internship at the Sheriff's Office, I thought when I showed up, I might not like forensics as much as I thought I did in class and that was terrifying because it was during the semester I would graduate.

I started my internship in Week 2 because the day I was to start, Tallahassee had a hurricane. Needless to say, this only increased my worry about my internship. However, when I did start and complete my first day, I felt nothing short of privileged. I chose a career to pursue, studied it in school, loved it and when I got to experience it outside of the classroom, from day one, I was 100% sure that this was what I

wanted to do for the rest of my life.

This past fall semester, I had the greatest opportunity of completing my capstone with the Leon County Sheriff's Office in Tallahassee. Instead of rotating through the varying departments like the other interns, I requested to be assigned to the crime scene unit.

In the crime scene unit, I was supervised by one of Tallahassee's Latent Print Examiners, Felicia Bowen. As the Latent Print Examiner for Leon County, Felicia examines latent prints for several agencies both inside and outside of the county. Then she sends them to FDLE for Verification. Felicia's position does not require her to go to crime scenes, so the crime scene investigators process and collect latent prints and then submit them to her.

During my internship, I was able to go on callouts/scenes with the crime scene unit whenever the violent crime unit requested assistance. At the scenes, I got to see how forensic specialists work a scene from start to finish and then how a case is turned over to analysts to process the evidence in the crime lab.

It was very rewarding to witness in the real world what I've learned in class and practiced during summer labs. It was also comforting to me as I realized through my internship, that I was prepared and more than capable of doing the job.

During my internship, three positions opened in the crime

scene unit but unfortunately, I do not meet all of the eligibility requirements until my citizenship is approved.

Currently, I am enjoying my desk job in the automotive industry and looking forward to a few vacations that I have planned while I await my citizenship approval.

I'm hanging on to my class materials so when it's time to work in forensics, I'll be ready.

To the current FSU PC CSI students, my best advice is to study hard, participate in your summer labs, and enjoy them. I witnessed and used everything I learned from my summer labs at my internship. My supervisor and colleagues were in awe at how much I knew and understood without them stopping to explain everything to me whenever they would share something with me.

This also gave me an advantage over the other interns because of the wealth of knowledge I gained in the public safety program at FSU. I now understand knowledge gives me confidence.

During my internship, I found it easy to establish professional relationships at the Sheriff's Office because I was confident in what I knew. I was able to talk to anybody about topics relating to whatever we were doing.

Once in your internship, seize every opportunity to learn and experience new things. I also urge you to be patient and to be consistent. Sometimes you will seek things that will take a very long time to achieve. You just

have to be patient, be consistent, and never give up.
