Hello everyone! My name is Reilly Calloway, and I am a Summer 2022 graduate of the Crime Scene Investigation program. While I barely have my foot out of the door at FSU, these past few months have been an absolute whirlwind. During the fall semester of last year, I was lucky enough to land an internship with the Escambia County Sheriff's Office Crime Scene Investigation Unit in Pensacola. During this internship, I spent much of my time in the lab assisting in processing evidence and riding along to calls that were made. I learned so much from this internship and genuinely had such a fun time with it.

With the experience I gained from this, I was lucky enough to receive a job offer as a Crime Gun Technician for the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Explosives (ATF).

Additionally, two weeks after summer labs ended, I had the opportunity, through FSU, to assist in an evidence recovery operation with Naval Criminal Investigative Service (NCIS), UCSI Dive Team, and TEMPEST from GCSC, led by Dr. Feulner. This was an amazing experience and really opened my eyes to how an organized operation works and what effort must go into it. On top of all of that, I will be beginning graduate school in the fall pursuing a Master of Science in Criminal Justice with a thesis concentration in forensic science at the University of North Alabama.

My biggest piece of advice for current students is to take every training and learning opportunity that you can get and run with it. I was able to interview for jobs because of the experience I received from my internship and because I had been exposed to real-world situations. Not only that, but taking these opportunities allows you to make connections with people from different states, cities, and agencies, which is HUGE in this field. It is important to push yourself and be the best at whatever you do, whether it is being a student, an intern, waiting tables, selling clothes, or being employed by a law enforcement agency.

You never know who is watching you or who will end up having to be a reference for you in the future. The only thing that can prevent you from reaching your goals is yourself and the more that you

Internship Highlight

Interning at the Global Forensic and Justice Center (GFJC), formally known as the National Forensic Science Technology Center (NFSTC), has been a rewarding experience where I have gained firsthand training in the CSI, DNA, and Biology Labs. I have had the pleasure of joining various agencies, including the US military Special Services and several branch intelligence units, in Forensic Evidence collection and processing under sensitive circumstances. I was also a part of the ASPCA's Animal Cruelty Workshop where I earned sixteen lab hours in training for Animal Cruelty Forensic and Evidence collection and Investigation. I was able to participate in the mock scene scenario exercises where I learned how to conduct Animal Cruelty Investigations. Among the scenarios were cases pertaining to dog fighting, puppy mills, and hoarding situations.

I am a part of a major experimental study where we were granted funding to conduct a study to find alternative solutions for Ninhydrin and 1,2 Indandione using various agents and

chemicals. We are trying to find a more affordable, less harmful, and more environmentally friendly solution to use for Latent Print processing. Although this study extends far beyond my internship, I have been given permission to continue with the study until its completion.




Delta Delta Epsilon


A portion of her nomination:
